## NEWS ITEMS AND ARTICLES

Science: The U.S. just created a big new biomedical research agency.

Congress created the Advanced Research Projects Agency for Health (ARPA-H) and gave it a \$1 billion startup investment. Its location either as a standalone agency or as part of the NIH, as well as its director, are to be determined.

New York Times: Follow the global youth protests this week

The global youth movement known as Fridays for Future has called on its members to organize protests around the world this Friday, March 25. Its rallying cry is "climate reparations and justice."

Science: <u>Rise in defense spending means smaller increase for science in new U.S. budget</u> The final 2022 spending bill trimmed Biden's big spending boosts for research, though Congress agreed to give roughly 5% more money to many federal science agencies.

Indiana Gov. Eric Holcomb vetoed a last-minute attempt to sneak through restrictions on state agency emergency actions and regulations on the environment and other issues embedded inside a blockchain bill.
